The "New Wave" Is Building

Data General's "New Wave" employee referral program is definitely making waves. Since the start of the program, just two months ago, employees have referred 140 Sales, Systems Engineering or product development engineering candidates, and so far, 20 of those have been hired. That means a total of \$25,000 in referral bonuses will be paid to the employees who referred them. Employees receive \$1,000 for the first referral who is hired; \$2,000 for the second referral who is hired; and \$3,000 for each subsequent referral who is hired.

Making a referral is easy:

1. Obtain a resume or completed Data General application from the candidate you wish to refer.
2. Submit the resume/application with an Employee Referral form to your Human Resources representative. Forms are available from Human Resources.
3. You will receive confirmation that your referral was received, and your "New Wave" poster will be sent to you.
4. You will be notified if your candidate is hired, and you will receive your bonus payment within four weeks of the date of hire.

Win A "New Wave" Trip

If you refer a Sales, Systems Engineering or product development engineering candidate you will be eligible to win one of four "New Wave" weekend vacations for two, and if your candidate is hired you will be eligible to win a one week vacation for two in Hawaii.

To be eligible for the special prize drawing in July you must submit your referral by July 11.

Also planned for the near future is the introduction of DG/UX INTERACTIVE RPG II, which allows users to take advantage of UNIX applications, as well as the wide range of software tools available for the proprietary AOS/VS operating system.

AOS/VS INTERACTIVE RPGII software prices range from \$960 to \$15,200, depending on processor.

PCB Engineering Group Efforts Recognized

The Clayton Printed Circuit Board (PCB) Fabrication plant recently recognized the Westboro PCB Engineering group for its outstanding efforts displayed over the last two to three years. The group was presented with a plaque to signify Clayton's appreciation. The group's efforts have resulted in a significant increase in the quality of the PCB design data that the PCB Engineering group sends to the Clayton plant.

"Clayton has been working with the PCB Engineering group virtually since our opening," says Pat Nathan, Engineering manager at Clayton. "In the last three years, however, that relationship has been much closer. As board complexity has increased, so have the demands put on the PCB Engineering layout group to produce a manufacturable product."

The Westboro PCB Engineering group uses CAD tools to convert design data, received from the various design engineering groups, into PCB design intent data. This PCB layout data is then sent to Clayton where it is converted into photo tools and drill data which are used to manufacture the finished PCB.

Clayton manufactures PCBs for Data General assembly plants in Portsmouth, Apex, Southboro, Manila, Bangkok and Mexico, where they are integrated into nearly every product Data General sells. In addition to the assembly plants, Clayton provides prototype PCBs to the design groups for new product development.

"Several years ago, Clayton was experiencing some serious concerns with design data. These issues caused unnecessary scrap in Manufacturing and, perhaps more importantly, impacted new product release," says Pat.

"Both groups put much effort into understanding Clayton's needs and developing systems that would check to ensure that these needs were met. This commitment took a great deal of effort by many people. We look forward to continuing to improve the relationship between the groups and to further improve the quality of the design intent data received in Clayton."

The end result of these improvements is that most data bases are received with no problems detected. This has helped Clayton achieve a 400 percent im-

provement in the speed in which Engineering samples are now being delivered and is a good illustration of the benefits of "doing it right the first time."

Data General Makes Dream A Reality

As a young girl growing up in El Salvador, Yolanda Hidalgo dreamed of someday coming to America to make a better future. After ten years of hard work and some help from Data General, Yolanda took her dream into yet another dimension when she graduated from Clark University last month with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

"I didn't come to America in search of great wealth or material belongings, I came for something abstract," says Yolanda, who has been working with Data General for 13 years. "I came here for hope, for an education, for a future. I knew I might have to struggle for some time in this country and that I could not afford an education. I would have to get a job to help achieve that goal. In El Salvador, you had to be an "Albert Einstein" and work for the government in order to go to college. I was just a regular, ordinary person."

Although she had a good background in English, when Yolanda came to the U.S., she decided to get a job as a live-in maid in order to "better learn the English language" in its everyday use.

Yolanda had a long work history as a secretary in El Salvador, and worked in the government's Treasury office. Through the encouragement of a friend and excellent work references, Yolanda left her maid's job and was hired as a secretary by Data General in 1976. She has held various positions within different departments, and since 1983 she has been working in the Latin American Marketing area.

During her interview with Data General, Yolanda admits she did not immediately realize the company would pay for her education through the Tuition Reimbursement program. "At first, I didn't pay attention to all the benefits Data General offers, it was such a frightening step to take. My goal was to be a secretary, but the dream still lingered."

In 1978 Yolanda gathered up her courage and enrolled in Newbury Junior College. In 1982, she went on to Clark University. "I loved the fact that Data General did not tell you where you had to go to school. They gave me freedom of choice," Yolanda says.

Yolanda advises those considering to further their education or those already in the process to "go for it. When you finally do finish, you'll look back and never regret it. It's a personal, rewarding thing that you will have forever and it will enrich all aspects of your life. If people can envision that, then they'll get that little push they need. I believe the doors are open. Data General, thank God, paid for my education." Yolanda also believes that her educational achievement would not have been possible without the supportive efforts of many employees, "especially Richard Bright," general manager of the Latin American group.

Helicopter Schedule Update

Effective Monday, June 27, the Data General helicopter will operate on the following schedule. Service is available to all employees travelling on company business on a first-come, first-serve basis. The traveler's cost center is charged \$45 for trips between Westboro/Southboro - Durham/Portsmouth and between Durham/Portsmouth - Westbrook, or \$75 for trips between Westboro/Southboro - Westbrook.

To make reservations call Corporate Travel in Westboro at extension 232-HELI (232-4354). Passengers must be at the helipad five minutes before the scheduled departure time for the loading and safety briefing. Unless delayed by weather, flights will depart precisely on time or earlier if all scheduled passengers are boarded.

Passengers desiring to depart or arrive at Southboro may do so by advising the reservationist. The actual departure time may be a few minutes before or after the scheduled time shown for Westboro/Southboro.

Mail and packages may be left in the mailbox at each helipad for delivery. Senders should check with Corporate Travel to ensure that the scheduled flight is going. It is the responsibility of the sender to arrange for the pick-up of any materials at the destination. The pilot will deliver the material to the appropriate mailbox, but the mailboxes are not serviced by the mailrooms. Any package weighing more than five pounds must be pre-arranged for delivery with Corporate Travel.

When making reservations, passengers will be required to provide their weight. This information must

reflect the passenger's "travelling" weight, including briefcase, packages, etc., which is important in determining the aircraft's weight.

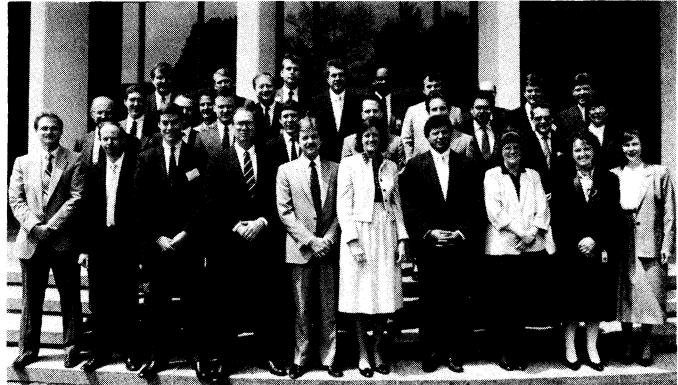
