Portable To PC Link Is Announced

Data General has announced PC LIAISON, a software package that enables a user to transfer data files between the DATA GENERAL/One portable computer and an IBM PC or IBM XT computer.

PC LIAISON allows a DATA GENERAL/One to access the 5-1/4-inch diskette drives of the IBM PC or XT and the hard disk of the XT. In addition to file transfer, PC LIAISON allows programs which are not copy protected to be run on the DATA GENERAL/One from the PC drives.

According to Agnes Imregh, manager of Software Marketing and Acquisitions for the Desktop Division, "With PC LIAISON users can now generate their own data files using popular applications such as Framework, dBase III, Wordstar and Lotus 1-2-3, and then transfer them between the DATA GENERAL/One and the IBM PC."

Agnes continues, "PC LIAISON is well documented, easy to use and to set up. In most cases it is the ideal 5-1/4-inch diskette solution."

The package is available immediately and is priced at \$180.

Data General Security Is People-Oriented

While many people think of security as cops apprehending robbers, Corporate Security at Data General is hardly a Hill Street Blues episode. Security at Data General is a people-oriented preventive approach to the protection of company assets.

According to Corporate Safety/Security Director Harvey Burstein, "Security personnel must work together with employees in a cooperative effort to avoid concerns and minimize risks that can occur in a billion-dollar company. They must be people-oriented, so employees do not view them as adversaries." Even their "look" is geared to professional interaction - sporting blazers rather than blue uniforms.

Since coming to Data General more than six years ago, Harvey has incorporated his business-oriented, preventive approach to security at Data General. He explains that Security personnel at Data General developed a thorough, working-knowledge of the business, so they can work together with managers on spotting potential problems and dealing with them jointly.

"For example, a Security manager who does not really understand Purchasing is not able to minimize the risks associated with doing business in that area," Harvey says. "You have to take a preventive approach. And that can only be accomplished by understanding the business and the particular needs of that department."

Security is more effective working with each employee to resolve concerns before they arise rather than waiting for one to happen.

"Corporate Security is the protection of all assets, real and personal, tangible and intangible," says Harvey. "It is Security's responsibility, working closely with local managers and supervisors, to ensure Data General policy is implemented.

"In this highly competitive industry, proprietary information is one of the company's most valuable assets. Unsecured proprietary information in unlocked offices, data left on cubicle desks rather than locked files, research data left on blackboards exposed to ground level windows, failure to ensure frequent and regular password changes for access to computerized information and to immediately deny computer access to those who have terminated or transferred are matters of real concern to Security personnel and all employees. Such conditions are unacceptable. Continuous monitoring is needed to protect company assets. Help from all employees is of paramount importance."

Meet Harvey Burstein

Harvey's preventive approach to security stems from a long and varied career in the security field. Soon after graduating law school in 1948, Harvey worked as an FBI special agent on espionage and foreign intelligence cases in Washington and Chicago.

After six years of government service, Harvey relocated to the Boston area where he started his own law practice while doing security-consulting work. He became head of Security at MIT, where he organized its campus police force.

He began lecturing on criminal justice and security at schools such as MIT, Indiana University, Michigan State, Fordham University, Cornell and Northeastern, among others.

While on the lecture circuit, Harvey worked as director of Security for Sheraton Corporation of Boston and later, as corporate Safety and Security director at New England Mutual Life.

Sharing his experiences in the field of security, Harvey has written many articles dealing with security management and practices. He also has written books on security as a management function and tool.

Now in its second edition "Hotel Security Management" is written for hotel executives and general managers on how to integrate security into hotel operations.

Just as Harvey had done at Data General, the book stresses the importance of Security working with people to prevent risks and concerns before they can arise.

Virginia Tech Enhances EE Department With Donation

Virginia Tech's electrical engineering department recently received an ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer, valued at more than \$400,000, from Data General. The system will be used in the department's new VLSI (very large scale integrated) circuit design laboratory.

Electrical engineering researchers at Virginia Tech are participating in a National Science Founda-

tion program that enables micro-chip designers to submit their designs for manufacture to the University of Southern California's Information Science Institute. When students receive the actual chip manufactured from their design they can then test it for functional efficiency and have an evaluation made of their overall design processes.

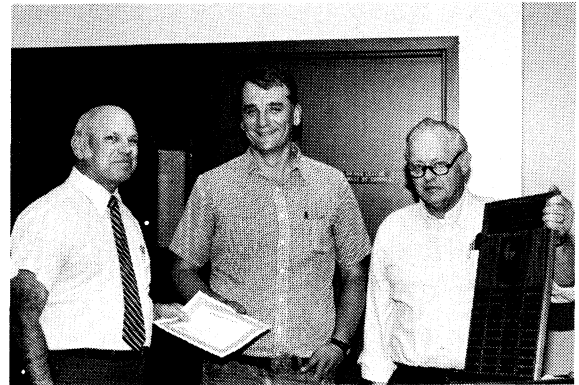
May Is High Blood Pressure Month

During the month of May, which has been designated "High Blood Pressure Month" nationwide, Data General-Westboro employees are invited to have their blood pressure checked.

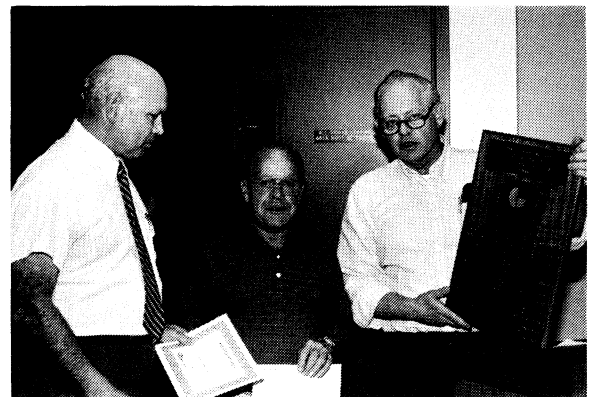

Seventh Annual Road Race Today

Park refreshment stands will be open on a cash basis for other items and adult beverages also will be available on a cash basis.

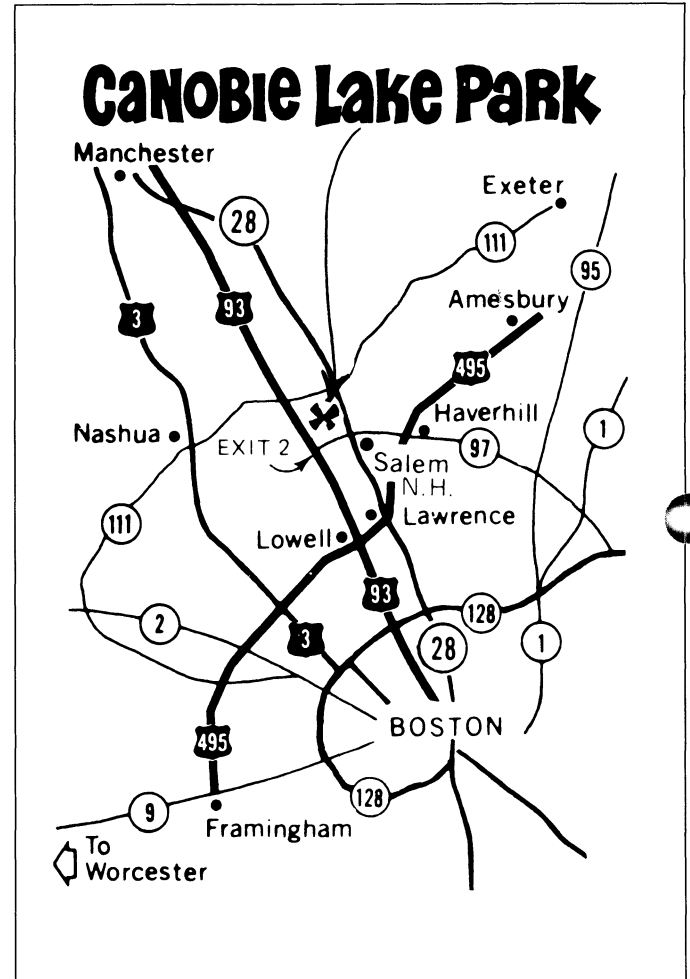
