A Partnership With The Community

Local educational, health and welfare, civic and cultural organizations have been getting a helping hand from Data General, recently. Through both equipment and cash donations made over the past several months, the company is strengthening its role as a corporate citizen of the communities in which it has facilities.

The following highlights some of the recent contributions the company has made to local groups.

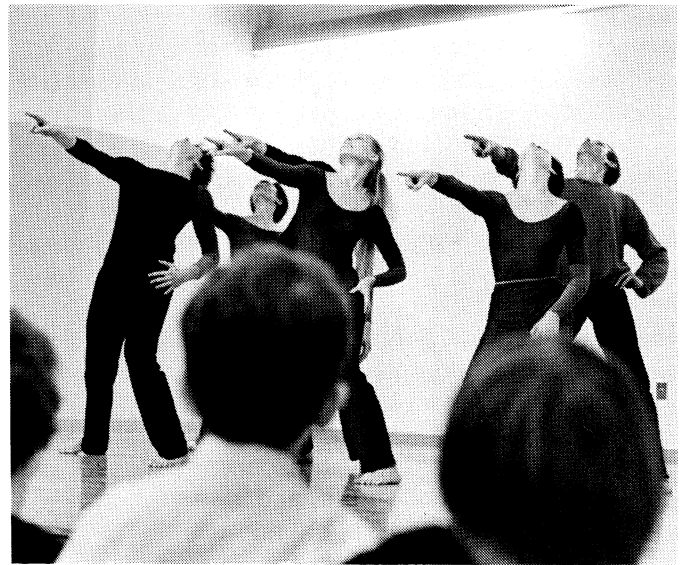
Education

Data General has donated several thousand dollars to support local educational endeavors.

- Westboro High School recently received a \$150,000 donation of computer equipment, software and support to acquaint students with computer-based tools for everyday business applications. As part of the donation package, a group of Westboro High School teachers currently is receiving training in CEO comprehensive electronic office software. The training is being made available through Educational Services.
- The Massachusetts Pre-Engineering Program (MASSPEP) for minority students was presented with a donation to improve the quality of its educational programs, particularly in mathematics and science. MASSPEP sponsors engineering-related courses after normal school hours and during the summer to students in the Boston and Cambridge public schools.
- Money also was donated to help promote "Operation Interlock," a cooperative engineering program between the North Shore Community College and the University of Lowell.

Health And Welfare

Data General helped the Central Massachusetts' Regional office of the Massachusetts Society For The Prevention Of Cruelty To Children purchase and renovate a house for abused and neglected kids.



Pupils in Milford Public schools recently learned about the world of dance and music, in a Data General-sponsored program by the Concert Dance Company of Boston. The company regularly supports schools and non-profit organizations in communities where employees are located.

- Contributions also were made to Serenity, Inc., a non-profit residential care and rehabilitation program in Natick for women recovering from alcoholism.

Civic

- Among those civic groups which have received a Data General donation is the Massachusetts' 4-H Club, located in Ashland. The funds are being used for special educational opportunities in leadership and citizen development to kids in the Worcester County area.
- Northboro Family and Youth Services was able to set up an "After School Activity Center" for middle-school students, thanks to support received from Data General.

Cultural

- Supporting the arts, Data General has sponsored several performances of the Concert Dance Company of Boston for pupils at Milford Public Schools. The concerts helped children expand their knowledge of the wide range of dance styles, learn what it

takes to create dances out of movements and understand what is needed to become a professional dancer.

- In addition, the company contributed to "Elder Edges," a program which integrates poetry and art created by senior citizens with music and interpretive dance. This program brings performing arts to nursing homes in the Framingham area.

\$1.8 Million Contract At Spanish University

Data General has been awarded a \$1.8 million contract to provide the University of Santiago de Compostela a network of office automation and information management systems. These systems will be used in the university's 38 colleges located in four provinces of Northern Spain.

The university will purchase 28 ECLIPSE MV/Family computers running Data General's CEO comprehensive electronic office software for office automation. The contract also includes more than 50 DATA GENERAL/One portable personal computers and 100 DASHER/One intelligent workstations.

The computers will be used for a combination of administrative, and research and development tasks in the various colleges of the university, including the engineering, architecture, and veterinary departments. Administrative applications will include student administration, payroll, accounting and general ledger, and personnel administration.

Research and development applications will include high energy physics and physical chemistry, as well as medical diagnosis and teaching. Already installed at the university is an ECLIPSE MV/4000 computer being used for research in artificial intelligence.

The University of Santiago, founded in the 16th century, is one of the oldest universities in Spain with more than 42,000 students. Composed of seven campuses, the university plans to link all of its 38 colleges with Data General computers through a variety of switched or Ethernet local area networks.

Legislators, Officials Meet To Discuss Issues

Massachusetts state senators and representatives met with high-technology industry executives last week to review legislative and business concerns within the state. The briefing, conducted at Data General's Corporate Conference Center, was sponsored by the company and the Massachusetts High Technology Council (MHTC).

Among the issues Sen. John Houston and Representatives Patricia Walrath, John Driscoll, and Richard Moore discussed with President Ed de Castro and other members of the MHTC were legislative goals, the problems of traffic congestion, state taxes and education.

Rep. Walrath voiced concern on how state aid is given to towns and cities since the passage of Proposition 2 1/2. She also said that action on solid waste and hazardous waste disposal may be a priority this year.

Like his colleague, Rep. Driscoll believed waste disposal was a critical issue, but felt that the private sector needs to undertake the major initiative to solve the problem. He praised the MHTC's past initiatives on other issues, saying he appreciated its input to the Taxation Committee, of which he is a member.

In addition to sponsoring one of three MHTC-backed bills regarding a state tax limit, Rep. Moore said his priorities include the construction of the Route 146/Massachusetts Turnpike interchange, which may help to alleviate congestion problems on Route 9. He also stated that as the federal government reduces its budget deficit, pressure will be put on state and local governments to increase many public programs.

Eugene Manno, group vice president of Honeywell Information Systems, reported, "The goal of the Massachusetts High Technology Council is to make the state of Massachusetts the most attractive place in which to live and work, and create, operate and expand high-technology business. Achieving our goal will certainly expand and improve job opportunities for Massachusetts' citizens. Higher productivity will lead to more revenue, which will lead to greater tax revenue, and as a result there will be a better

economic environment and improved quality of life for all Massachusetts' citizens."

Ed, speaking about the need for improvements in the state's infrastructure - the public's roadways, harbors, bridges, parking facilities, etc. - agreed that the state has become more attractive for the high-technology industry, but improvements are still necessary. "Today Massachusetts is a good place to do business, ... but I believe there are some clouds on the horizon. We ought to look ahead and find out what we can do to make sure that our infrastructure is in order." Ed cited the parking problems of Logan Airport as an example. "I think that's intolerable for a major airport that must support industry."

MHTC President Howard Foley discussed the industry's support of a state tax limit and its importance to domestic and international competitiveness. The council currently supports three proposals now before the legislature designed to establish a statutory limit on the growth of state tax revenues linking that growth to the growth of wages and salaries. The limit, according to the council, will help the state achieve long-term fiscal stability.

As an example of how the industry continues its support for education, Southboro Plant Manager Bill Kelleher reviewed the Manufacturing division's teacher training program, which began two years ago. Since that time, nearly 200 teachers from around the state have been trained on computers.

Similar briefings continue to be sponsored throughout the state. Says Public Affairs Director Brad Stroup, who acted as moderator at the Westboro meeting, "This program complements our

ongoing effort to strengthen our communications with state officials. As a result of this kind of interchange, both groups can better see how we can help each other."

Support Plus Service Enhances Software Coverage

Data General has introduced Support Plus Service, a new service package that supports more than 200 of the company's software products used in the U.S. and Canada.

Support Plus Service offers major enhancements to the company's previous Software Product Service Agreement (SPSA) package. These enhancements include the addition of weekend software support telephone assistance for key Data General 32-bit software; standard on-site assistance (optional under SPSA); and customer access to a new On-Line Information Service (OIS), implemented through the Comuserve Network; in addition to a number of new support options.

"Support Plus Service features greater flexibility and functionality than the previous SPSA service and is better tailored to meet the needs of our users," says Tony Nicoletti, vice president of Field Engineering Support.

Pricing of the Support Plus Service varies according to software products selected. The average monthly charge for a typical AOS/VS configuration on an ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer system is approximately \$700.

job applicants and other visitors. Employees should use one of the many employee parking areas.

There is no reserved or preferred parking at Data General, except for visitors and handicapped employees.

Use of all handicap parking spaces at Data General-Westboro requires that an employee's car display a handicap parking sticker.

To obtain a sticker, an employee may pick up an authorization form at the Health Services office in Building 14A or 14B. These forms must be returned to the nurse. At that time, a handicap parking sticker will be issued through Corporate Security.

If handicap parking on a temporary basis becomes necessary, an employee may apply through the Health Services office for temporary authorization.

Cars not parked in lined spaces create potentially dangerous situations by blocking hydrants, fire lanes, walkways, entrances, etc.
